Jan 15 – Take a 5-10-minute walk. Identify 2 of your biggest stressors and how they impact you.

Jan 16 – Find 2 factors that charge your battery. Pick 1 to do today.

Jan 17 – Do 3 – 5 minutes of strategic breathing.

Jan 18 – Choose a behavioural strategy to try and set a SMART goal for the weekend.
