Fiscal Year 2020-21 Audit Process and Results

The OPC's fiscal year (FY) runs from July 1 – June 30. As a not-for-profit association, we are required to retain an accounting firm to conduct a full audit of our finances each year. RSM Canada LLP has conducted our audits for the past four years. The consolidated financial statements include the results of the OPC (Membership, Benefits, Professional Learning), ISL (International School Leadership) and PAP (Principal Association Projects). We are pleased to report that the OPC received a clean audit opinion, which was reviewed and approved by Provincial Council on September 28 and received at the AGM on October 21, 2021. Our <u>audited financial statements</u> are available to Members in the Finances section of our website.

There were questions in the House last week about <u>\$10 per day child care</u>, <u>smaller classes</u>, <u>needs-based system for autism services</u>, <u>menstrual products for First Nations schools</u> and <u>mental health supports for Indigenous youth</u>.

Bhutila Karpoche (NDP) introduced <u>Bill 25, *Early Years and Child Care Worker Act*</u>, which would establish an Advisory Commission to develop recommendations on how to support early years and child care workers, address staffing shortages, and consider increased wages and improved working conditions.
