How We Set Our Annual Budget

The OPC's department leads, senior team, Executive and Provincial Council all contribute to setting our annual budget. We start planning one year in advance. The first draft of the budget is based on the previous year's actual results and the current year's budget, driven by the priorities and actions in our strategic plan. It is presented to the Executive in January. They confirm whether we've captured all of our current plans and consider the possibility of new projects or events (bargaining, Ministry, advocacy) that should be taken into account. The next draft is presented to Provincial Council at our February meeting. Council then conducts "horizon gazing," anticipating opportunities and threats that need to be reflected. After final adjustments, the proposed budget is presented to Council at the May meeting for approval and implementation in the next fiscal year. Queen's Park

There were questions in the House last week about gender-based violence, wait lists for children and youth mental health services, government plans to help young learners catch up, and school safety.

Bhutila Karpoche (NDP) introduced Bill 53, the <u>Right to Timely Mental Health and Addiction Care</u> <u>for Children and Youth Act</u>. The bill would ensure that youth under 25 years of age, who need mental health or addiction services, receive access to the required service within 30 days.

The House is now in recess until February 21.
