Violent Incidents in Schools

In recent years, our Protective Services Team has seen an increase in violent incidents in schools, with the recent alarming trend of incidents involving the use of a weapon to cause or threaten bodily harm. At the same time, P/VPs continue to navigate the complexities of human rights. Applying mitigating and other factors in student discipline has become subject to much debate and scrutiny. The PST advises Members to carefully review and follow all board policies and procedures related to student discipline. These policies are based on legislation and, if followed accurately, should attract support from board officials when challenged. Summit on Public Education in Canada – April 3 and 4, 2023

We are organizing a two-day <u>Summit on Public Education in Canada</u> to develop a vision for the future of K-12 education in Canada. The event will take place in Toronto, and its purpose will be to identify key challenges and possible solutions for education, with a broad vision for future ready students, leadership, anti-oppression and anti-colonialism, to which all Canadians can aspire. Bill 124

Last week, an Ontario court struck down Bill 124, the provincial wage restraint legislation passed in 2019. The Act limited the wages of public sector employees to 1% per year for 3 years. As you know, when we negotiated our provincial agreement with the government in 2021, we were bound by this legislation, so could not negotiate more than a 1% increase in salaries. The government has announced that it will appeal the ruling, so this issue will remain before the courts. We will continue to monitor the situation to determine if/when we can negotiate an appropriate remedy on your behalf.
