Continued Staff Shortages Advocacy

Last week, we sent another <u>letter to the Minister</u>, this one also copied to the Premier, from the 3 provincial P/VP groups, regarding the ongoing issue of staff shortages in schools. We expressed our concern about recent announcements that have been made by the government to assist with recruitment, training, peer support and tuition relief for several professional sectors, but not for our sector. With the ongoing issues that all schools are experiencing in all employee groups, the sector is at a crisis point. We need the government to provide immediate attention to this very serious issue, offering the same supports and funding to address staffing shortages, recruitment and mental health. Our students, staff, families and communities deserve nothing less.
