It's our intention that the survey results and recommendations become a conversation starter for stakeholders across the province that will lead to positive changes. These conversations will move us forward to act collectively to support our school communities and ourselves through a trauma-sensitive leadership approach.

Report – Improving Mental Health and Well-Being

Last week, the Ontario Coalition for Children and Youth Mental Health, of which we are a member, released a report entitled <u>Let's Put Our Heads Together</u>, focusing on coordinating efforts to improve mental health and well-being for Ontario's children and youth. The report outlines the Coalition's understanding of priority issues related to system coordination; equity; and mental health promotion, early identification and prevention of mental health concerns. Recommendations are provided to support a coordinated system that ensures access to timely, integrated, responsive and equitable mental health services for children and young people across Ontario.
