Failure to do so will result in a loss of historical protective services coverage for any employment-related event or circumstance that arose or occurred prior to becoming an OPC Member, and medical evidence of good health will be required to receive LTD insurance. Fiscal Year 2023 Audit Process and Results

Our fiscal year runs from July 1 – June 30. As a not-for-profit association, we are required to retain an accounting firm to annually conduct a full audit of our finances. RSM Canada LLP has conducted our audits for the past six years. The consolidated financial statements include the results of the OPC (Membership, LTD Benefits, Professional Learning), ISL (International School Leadership) and PAP (Principal Association Projects). We are pleased to report that the OPC received a clean audit opinion, which was reviewed and approved by the Provincial Council on September 27th and received at the AGM on October 19, 2023. Our <u>audited financial</u> statements are available to Members in the Finances section of our website.

Queen's Park

There were questions in the House last week about the <u>math curriculum</u>, <u>school nutrition</u> <u>programs</u>, <u>waiting list for Autism treatment</u>, <u>consultations on a childcare workforce</u> <u>strategy</u>, <u>supporting Colleges to prepare students for the future</u> and <u>funding for OSAP</u>.

Lucille Collard (L) has introduced Bill 133, <u>Kids' Online Safety and Privacy Month Act</u>, which would proclaim this safety month in September each year. It would highlight the importance of digital supervision, education and responsibility; emphasize the role of parents and the wider community in protecting children from online dangers; and ensure that children can navigate the digital world confidently and safely.

Nolan Quinn (PC) has introduced Bill 123, <u>Erin's Law – Child Sexual Abuse Prevention and Reporting.</u> The Bill would require school boards to establish a policy engaging students annually in discussions about child sexual abuse prevention and reporting.
